UNITED NATIONS PARTNERSHIP

The Martindale Center continues its important work with the Lehigh University/United Nations Partnership.

On April 9–11, the two organizations were chosen to host the world's first MODEL ILO simulation in collaboration with the International Labour Organization (ILO). This event included engaging with senior ILO officials and challenged participants to simulate an ILO deliberation on the topic of child labor.

In May, the Martindale Center published *Policy Briefs on the Future of Work*, prepared by 11 teams of students and young professionals serving as research externs with the Lehigh University/United Nations Partnership working in affiliation with the ILO.

MICROFINANCE AND SUSTAINABILITY

Sponsored by the Martindale Center, the Lehigh Africa Business Club held its annual conference "Africa Continental Free Trade Agreement: Driving Growth and Innovation in a Virtual Economy" virtually on May 29. According to the World Bank, the agreement has the potential for lifting as many as 30 million Africans from extreme poverty and raising the incomes of 68 million others who live on less than \$5.50 per day.

DATA FOR IMPACT

Data for Impact (D4I), a ten-week project-centric research internship program for highly motivated students focused on data science, analytics, visualization and execution, is co-sponsored by the Martindale Center in partnership with the Office of Creative Inquiry. Dr. Todd Watkins and other Lehigh faculty are mentoring projects and offering workshops throughout the summer.
